Winchester College hosts Indian Music Workshop for MRC

MRC musicians were mesmerised by the exotic sounds of the tabla and sitar when they joined Winchester boys for a workshop and recital by visiting Bollywood stars expert in the art of Indian classical music.

The musicians explained to the audience that they had been born into musical families and recounted tales of their experiences in film and television production. Said student, Amy, "It was all very unusual to us. The musicians demonstrated the Ragas (melodies) of the sitar and the Talas (rhythms) of the tabla, and told us how once they were established within a piece it could continue for two or three hours, building to a dramatic and emotional climax. I'm not sure I would have the stamina!"

Safe Drive Stay Alive

Years 12 and 13 students returning from the West Sussex Fire and Rescue *Safe Drive Stay Alive* presentation at Chichester Festival Theatre, all agreed that the event had made an enormous impact on their thoughts about learning to drive.

Said Pastoral Leader, Mrs Jayne Beesley, "Fire Servicemen showed us horrendous, *no holes barred*, real life images of road accidents and, along with representatives from Accident and Emergency and the Police Force, recounted their all too regular, harrowing experiences. The whole audience was clearly stunned."

The event launched with an nightclub dance music session to buoy the audience in preparation for some hard hitting messages. Guest speakers included victims of unspeakable road accidents; a mother who had lost both her sons in separate incidents and a 21 yr old, ex-county rugby captain, now brain damaged and semi-paralysed. Said Director of Learning: Key Stage 5, Mr Philips, "We are all aware of the dangers of using our roads, but most of us, thank goodness, are never a party to such destructive, life changing episodes as those we learned about today. The event had a profound effect on all of us."

Always wear your seatbelt was a major emphasis, illustrated by graphic accounts of the fatal impact on those in the front seats caused by passengers in the back not 'belting up'.

On return to College the common room buzzed with views on the event. *Cameron Schmidt*, already riding a moped and looking forward to learning to drive a car soon said, "You don't realise how fast accidents happen. One minute you're driving along, the next you're on the side of the road waiting for an ambulance. As a rugby player myself, hearing the ex-player's story really got home to me." *Megan, Chris* and *Ryan* all agreed that although shocking it had been a very worthwhile thing to attend. Said *Megan*, "The dancing stuff at the beginning went on a bit too long, but as the presentation unfolded we could see the point of putting us in a good mood – it was a real wake-up call for everyone of us who is keen to learn to drive."

We are at the midpoint of the academic year. Whilst it has been an extremely busy period since September we are still working hard to establish our new school. A process like this takes time, however we do not have the luxury of dawdling. I would therefore like to share with you *some* of the key improvements we have made in the last few months:

- For the first time, we have Achievement Plans in both Years 11 and 13. We recognise that students need support in reaching their projected targets and our job is to do everything possible to ensure students attain them. This work ranges from mentoring and tracking to after College booster sessions and just general 'chasing up' when work is not being done
- Early examination entries in Maths, Science and ICT are yielding improved GCSE examination results. Early entries will become a greater part of what the College does in future.
- There is now a firmly established whole College system which is improving the quality of teaching and learning. Regular classroom observations are helping to identify the very best teaching as well as that which can be improved. We have a large group of teachers and our Director of Pedagogy is developing a clear overall view and plan for future improvement.
- Our Home Call system is firmly in place. Parents can now be quickly texted about attendance, important events (such as Parents' and Options evenings), and emergency College closure.
- The College website now contains even more useful information. For example, the College calendar, information about coursework deadlines, revision and booster sessions, and also copies of all general letters sent home (such as those for Parents' Evenings). The website is still developing and will become even better over time by being responsive to parental need.
- A College Behaviour Policy is also in place which is shared with parents (please see the website) and understood by students. Behaviour will *always* be a priority for the College because it is closely linked to the quality of learning so this work is ongoing and more developments in this area will take place.
- There is now a strong after College enrichment programme; it covers anything from sport, to music to drama.

Other improvements have been made, however many more need still need to happen and we are working on them. One area we are closely looking at is the attendance of parents at *Parents' Evenings*. We take a register of attendance at such events and also note the overall percentage attendance. Since starting to do this methodically I have been struck by the low level of attendance at such evenings. The following statistics reveal an interesting story:

Year 9 Parents' Evening	(November)	–	49% attendance
Year 11 Parents' Evening	(October)	–	45%
Year 13 Parents' Evening	(October)	–	38%
Year 11 Parents' Evening	(January)	–	41%
Year 13 Parents' Evening	(January)	–	21%
Year 9 Options Evening	(January)	–	83%

Apart from the Options Evening, there is clearly a job of work for us all to do here. Student examination results have a strong connection to the degree of parental involvement in their child's education and Parents' Evenings are a part of this involvement. The College will re-examine and improve everything it does to communicate these events. I would also like to ask parents to regularly check our website for forthcoming events in the College calendar and also the letters that have gone home about them. Through *partnership* we *will* see our students achieving highly and being happy in their education.

It only remains for me to wish you all a good half term break. However, can I urge all those students in Years 10, 11, 12 and 13 who have forthcoming public examinations to work hard on their revision – it will pay them immense dividends!
