
Previously during the Spring lockdown, the students worked hard and made excellent progress in their learning despite the challenging conditions of working remotely from home. They were greatly supported in this throughout the period by not only the College, but also their parents and carers for which the College is very thankful. With the new lockdown, this is now being repeated with the same determination as last time.

Each child is receiving work for every lesson on their regular timetable. All students are expected to complete all work for each lesson and participation is closely monitored. Taking advantage of the technology available today and the skills of their incredible members of staff, some teaching will be live via Microsoft Teams giving students the opportunity to interact both with teachers and members of their class. Students will also be able to submit all their work online allowing teachers to mark and give feedback via this system. It is the College's intention that all children should have equal access to remote learning. To support families without sufficient technology resources to study remotely, last term the College distributed over 240 Chromebooks to support students without internet access.


During the lockdown period the College remains open for the vulnerable and keyworker children, of which there are over 100,














Year 10 GCSE Drama Pantomimes

made up from scratch! They sourced their own costumes, music, props and set to bring these to life in a hilarious day of laughter and performing. Performances were shown to Mrs Strachan and



Well done Year 10 GCSE Drama, you were all amazing:)



Food for A

Back in Autumn 2020 the College Community set itself a target of collecting 1000kg of essential food and goods by July 2021 for the Midhurst Foodbank to help local families in need.



Planning to hold a Foodbank Friday at the end of each half term, the College thought this was an ambitious target. At the end of October, the first appeal gathered almost 165kg of food and goodies including boxes of chocolates, biscuits - sweet and savoury, along with desserts and the regular basics which help to keep the shelves filled and are gratefully received as the weather gets colder.

Liz Willing, Co-ordinator of Midhurst Foodbank was astonished to see such a collection. For the pre-Christmas appeal the College asked families if they would donate "something special" so

the Foodbank could add a little something to the essential items in Christmas





deliveries and add a little extra to the Christmases of those in need of their help. On the day of collection an incredible 100 carrier bags containing 375.2kg of goods including a wide variety of seasonal treats for the festive season were handed over to the Foodbank.

The College have gathered 540kg of their 1000kg target of goods since September. The next appeal is due for mid-February. How this works will depend on the lockdown situation....

Midhurst Foodbank supports the residents of

the town as well as some of the surrounding villages. Last week, we responded to requests on each day of the working week. They are a team of about 60 volunteers, who depend on donations, as well as supplies from the Chichester Trussell Trust to meet these needs.




Huge congratulations are in order for Anna S-T in our Sixth Form for being selected to exhibit her work in the very prestigious exhibition run by The Arts Society.
