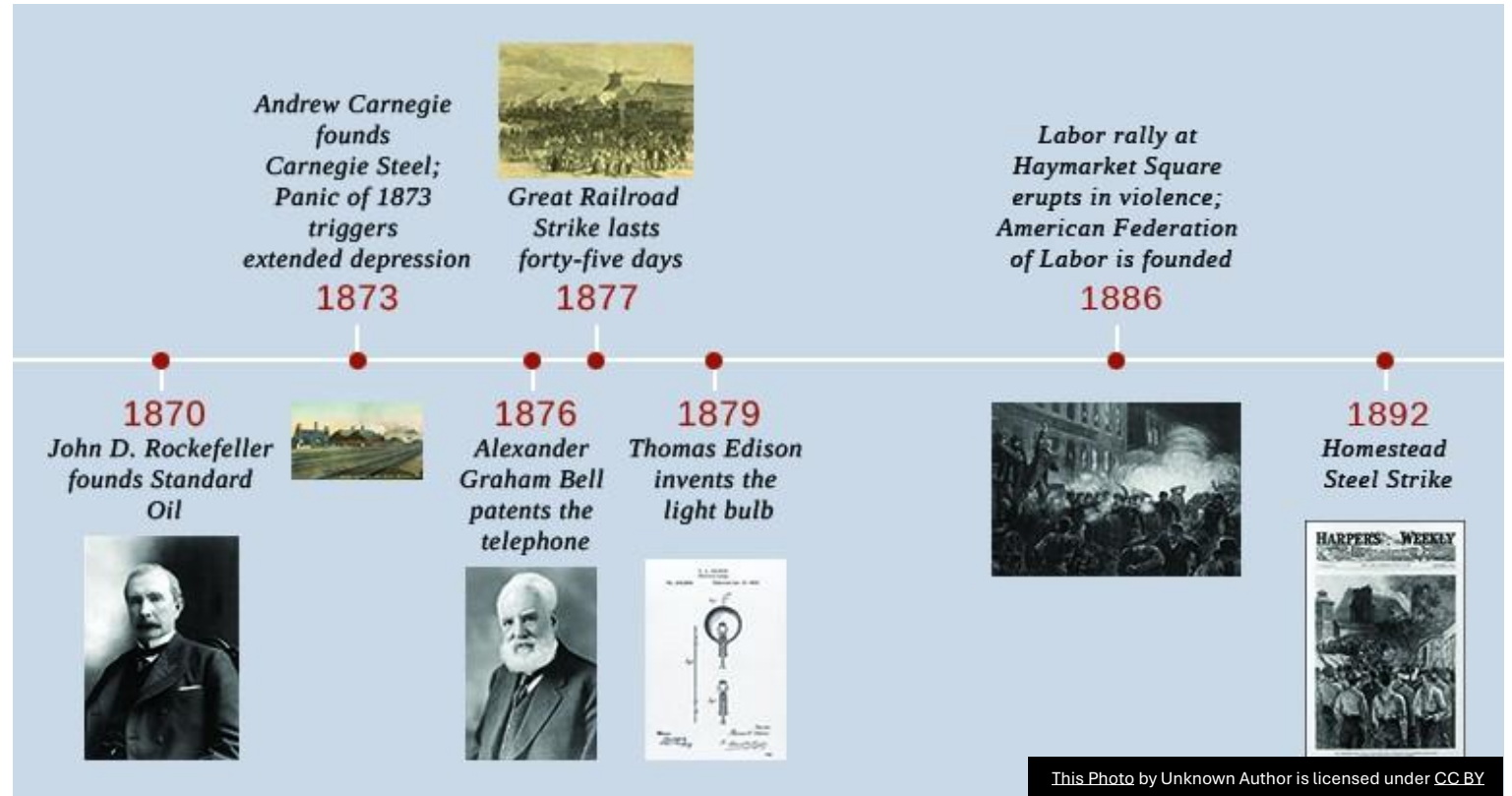

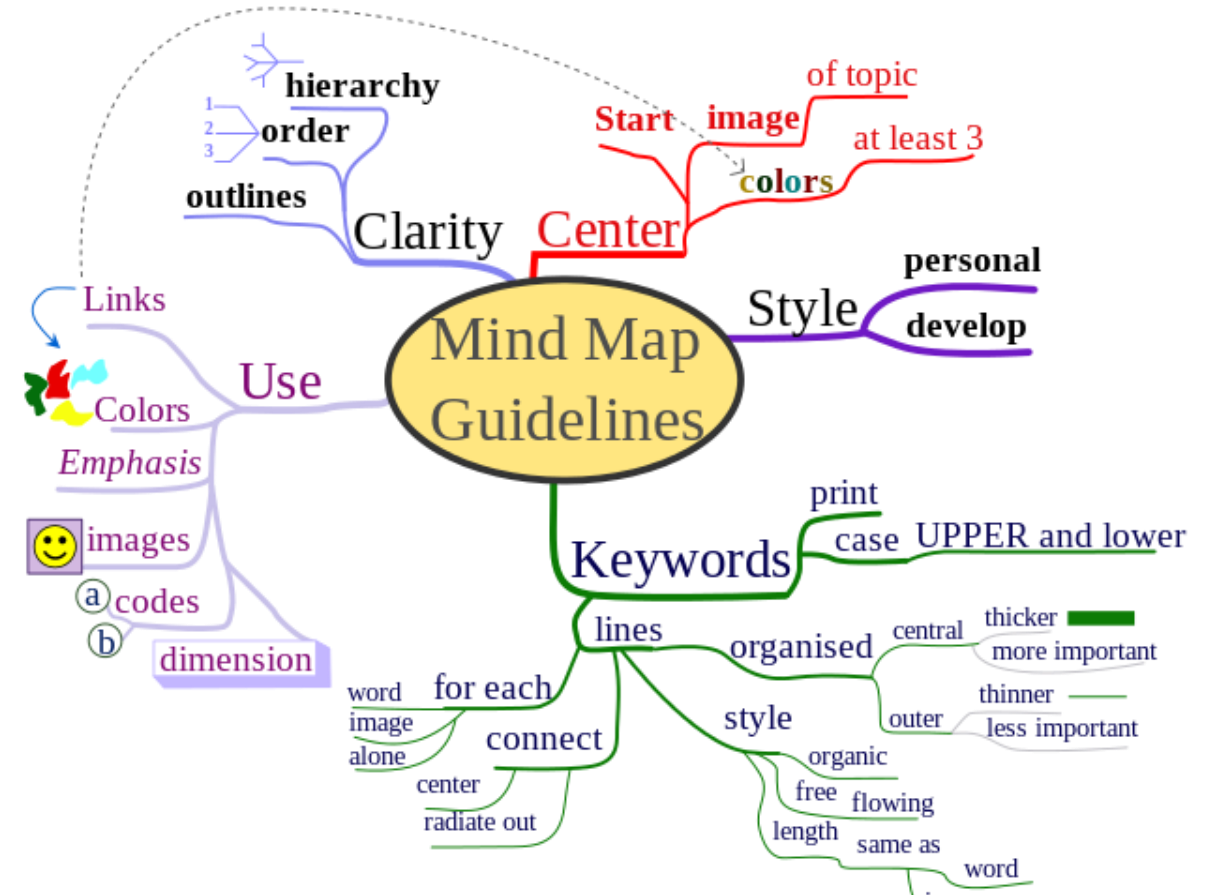
Odd One Out

Timeline or Flowchart,

Put events in history or evolution in chronological order, or show how steps for a recipe, experiment etc. Follow on from one to the next. Avoid waffle, select key words/events



Mind map
*Get away from
copying by
selecting key words
linked to a central
topic and showing
how each idea
branches out to
include more
details*



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- **Chocolate Bar.**
- *Imagine 8 squares in a delicious bar of your favourite chocolate.*
- *Fold a piece of paper into 8 squares*
- *Think of a key fact/equation/formula/term/ MFL vocabulary item to put in each square.*
- *If you're only just starting to revise, use your notes to find out something for each square*
- *Swap or share ideas with someone else*





Snowball,

Work together, add to each other's knowledge,
One student says something important about the topic being
revised

The next student repeats that concisely then adds something
more....and so on.



Lift Pass

Can you get to the point quickly? Say the most important things about a topic in less than a minute?

1. All make notes about a topic on MWB
2. Share with a partner
3. Present to the class
4. One brave person summarises the content concisely mentioning the most important points in a logical order as if they only had a short time in the lift to explain this!
